Warwick Honors Community Veterans

Lasting nearly two and a half hours, Warwick's annual Memorial Day Parade encompasses a large contingent of those who serve, and spans the Village from Village Hall to Warwick Cemetery to St. Stephen's Cemetery, ending at Memorial Park. Included in the parade are veterans from both the American Legion Nicholas Lesando Jr. Post #214 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post #4662, local officials, police, firefighters, emergency service workers, ladies' auxiliaries, Warwick scouts and charitable organizations. This year an old favorite joined the ranks: The Queen Village Queens Alumni marched the length of the parade, entertaining the crowds with music from their heyday.

Heat Doesn't Keep Crowds Home

Hundreds of residents lined the streets as the marchers headed to Warwick Cemetery for services that included speeches by Town Supervisor Michael Sweeton, Warwick Mayor Michael Newhard and Town Justice Peter Barlett. The services were opened with the reading of an email from a serviceman in Afghanistan thanking everyone for praying for him. Bruce Sutton, representing the American Legion, led the ceremony. Andrew Wenman of Boy Scout Troop 45 read the Gettysburg Address. Wenman will earn the rank of Eagle Scout at an awards ceremony on June 5 for assisting the veterans in organizing and placement of the flags on the graves for Memorial Day. Girl Scout Heather Storms, who rallied the community to help clean up the streets of Warwick during Operation Cleansweep in pursuit of the prestigious GSUSA Gold award, read the history of Taps.

Addressing Children as the Future

In previous years, the veterans have acknowledged their numbers are dwindling, and they look to the children to keep the traditions alive. Addressing the children, mostly in the form of attending scouts, Walt Parkinson explained the importance of volunteerism. "When we were needed, we showed up," said Parkinson, adding "let that guide your life."

As always, the Warwick High School Band provided the music for the parade, playing the National Anthem and "God Bless America" during the ceremony, which ended with a 21-gun salute and the bugler playing "Taps."

The parade continued along Route 17A to St. Stephen's Cemetery for a short service for the veterans buried there and then concluded by marching along Forester Avenue to Memorial Park for the final service of the day, followed by refreshments.

Florida Memorial Day Parade Sees Grief & Remembrance

Florida residents gathered on their lawns and sidewalks on Monday for their annual Memorial Day Parade. Services started earlier in the day with masses held at St. Joseph's Cemetery and the adjacent Jewish Cemetery, and afterward tears were wiped away as the parade kicked off at 2 p.m.

"We've come here to honor all of these guys that serve our country. They're the life and blood of Florida, NY," said Ed Kania.

Applause erupted as the flag was carried through the village to start the march. Despite the words "92 degrees" flashing on the Florida Fire Department ticker screen, both FFD and Florida Police Department members dressed in their suits and

All Around the Town

Seeking a New Vision for Warwick County Park

A meeting to discuss a master park and trail plan was held at the Warwick County Park on Wed., May 21 to solve a problem: the 705-acre plot that is home to 37 amenities including a banquet facility, playground, driving range, pro shop and an 18-hole golf course, makes up nearly 25% of Orange County's total parkland, yet represents only 2% of the county's use.

The visioning meeting opened by asking the audience to raise their hands if they had ever used the park's resources: only a small portion of the room raised their hands.

County Park Commissioner Richard Rose was joined by two members of the HDR engineering firm in an attempt to gather proposed public suggestions and converge them with collected data. This broad plan will serve as a "road map" for planners in the next ten or fifteen-years to improve the development and popularity of the park.

From Horse Trails to Solar Powered Pool

Suggestions included biking/hiking trails, tennis and volleyball courts, performing arts centers and museums. Of the more popular ideas was a botanical garden for agricultural use. Another thought was the installation of a solar-powered public pool, which would be the first in the county. Representatives of the Mid-Hudson Horse Trail Association brought up the statistic that Warwick has the third largest population of horses in the State, and requested that a horse trail be included in the master plan. Adding such attractions would not only improve the park's land usage, but would also add a significant amount of business to local establishments.

A master plan was implemented in 1974, however, 36 years have passed and many of its features have never been carried out. But, is the plethora of undeveloped land to be blamed for Warwick County Park's popularity problem? Instead, it was realized that the main problem with the park's usage is that "word just doesn't get out."

"Honestly, I worked at Maskers Apple Orchard for 13 years and didn't know this place existed," interjected Pine Bush resident Beth Kempf.

The first thing that can be seen by passersby is the commuter park-and-ride lot, which currently resides at the opening of the park. It is state-owned and necessary due to the lack of parking in the Village; however it remains an eyesore to the public.

"What's really unique about this place is that it's unknown," said HDR architect Mangus Sjoborg, but in discussing the park and ride, added: "What your front lawn looks like... that's who you are."

It is unclear whether or not the county park will continue to have the visual impression of a dull parking lot, or whether or not a new pool or amphitheater will be granted; however this new master plan bodes well for the future of Warwick County Park and its available services to Orange County.

Warwick Community Garden Nears Completion

As the weather gets warmer, many Warwickians look forward to planting and enjoying their own fruits and vegetables. Luckily for these garden enthusiasts, Warwick's Community Center and Community 2000/Sustainable Warwick are just near the completion of the Center's new community garden.

The 25' x 20' garden is slated to include both

individual plots and large community plots, but the exact division of the land has not yet been determined.

"That's one of the things that will be worked out in the next few days," explained Geoffrey Howard, chief organizer of the community garden and member of Sustainable Warwick.

What is to be done with the fruits and vegetables grown in the community garden also has yet to be determined.

"I think the broad outline is that people that work in the garden, said Howard, "certainly the communal part of the garden, they get the fruits of their labor shared among the group. But some of that will also be donated possibly to the Community Center itself or possibly to local food banks."

Also involved in the project is Courtni Hale, executive director of the Center for Natural and Traditional Knowledge (CNTK), which focuses on boosting local community production to strengthen the economy.

"One of Courtni Hale's plans," says Howard, "is to use the garden to teach lessons about permaculture, sustainable agriculture, organic gardening and that series of topics. Eventually, we hope to be constructing an outdoor classroom. But for the moment, it will be some stuff for the local children in the Community Center, both the younger children and the teens. There will be a program for community members...two-hour seminars, that kind of thing."

On Thurs., May 27, 10 volunteers from local Target stores visited the Community Center to help install deer fencing to protect the garden; the project, however, still needs an outdoor water hose connection from the Community Center to be entirely complete.

Two Soldiers - A Memorial Day Address

Today is a special day; a day of appreciation and remembrance; a day of sadness and of loss. It is this day we honor the men and women who are departed and whose actions and service will not be forgotten.

I would like to take this moment to speak of two men that we have recently lost. Reverend Duncan Truman and Senior Master Sergeant Nick Lesando. These two men epitomized all that is honorable and brave; they were consummate soldiers.

Nick was a Warwick boy who served in the U.S. Air Force; a veteran of World War II, Korea and Vietnam, he served for 21 years. He infused us, his community, with a deep understanding of the respect and reverence towards our soldiers and veterans. Through his actions, involvement and commitment he created an awareness of patriotism in our daily lives. He was a simple man of the earth, unpretentious and loyal. His love and companionship to his beloved wife and family was the only thing that may have surpassed his love for America. Nick was by inches and feet not a tall man, but by the measurement of a life well spent, a giant.

Reverend Truman is someone I knew my entire life and over those years I saw him in many roles: Minister, father, husband, educator and a friend. Duncan was a veteran of World War II and served with the 106th Infantry Division - first army in the European Theater. He landed on Utah Beach on D-Day and fought in the Battle of the Bulge. He received the Combat Infantry Badge. As Chaplain for the 106th Infantry Division, he delivered memorials throughout the U.S. In his retirement he devoted his time to counseling veterans especially those suffering the devastating effects of Post Traumatic Stress. He was a man of two cloths: an Army uniform and the Clerical clothing of a devoted spiritual leader. Duncan was all that is wise and compassionate.

Duncan and Nick were as unique and different as two men could be, but they were also bound by a commonality of purpose; the passionate wish to uphold and protect freedom and liberty. It is represented by a lifetime of service that went beyond a daily routine. In effect they remained soldiers long after the wars were over. Their vigilance and desire to help their fellow men, their devotion to our country and community was the air they breathed. They were educators, they were leaders, they were role models, they were humble.

We will miss these two remarkable Americans who while in our midst gave with such great generosity, and it is because of them we are left with a better world.

And as Americans, we are privileged to enjoy that pursuit of happiness thanks to those men and women who have served, or even given their lives, to preserve that basic right.

Each Memorial Day we commemorate those men and women who died while in military service to our Nation. In towns and villages across the County, we see visual reminders of this. Here on Main Street in Goshen there's a monument dedicated to the Orange Blossoms. They were the 124th New York Volunteer Infantry Regiment formed in the summer of 1862 as a volunteer unit during the American Civil War. They fought many important campaigns during the war, including the Battle at Gettysburg.

More recently, we were reminded of the sacrifices made by our military personnel when the Governor ordered flags to be flown at half-staff in honor of two Fort Drum Lieutenant Colonels who were killed in Afghanistan. They made the ultimate sacrifice on our behalf.

So, when you enjoy your backyard barbeque, or the time spent with family and friends on that day off from work and school, do not lose sight of the reason for that holiday. On Memorial Day, and every day, it's important that we remember and honor those who gave their lives for our country - honor their memories, honor their service. It's really the very least we can do, as they died for us, so that we may continue to enjoy life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Until next week, I wish you good health.

Senate Passes Legislation to Halt Bullying in Workplace

State Senator Thomas P. Morahan, Chairman of the Committee on Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities secured Senate passage of landmark legislation (S.1823-B) on May 12, which establishes a civil cause of action for employees who are subjected to an abusive work environment.

Specifically, this legislation provides legal redress for employees who have been harmed psychologically, physically or economically by being deliberately subjected to abusive work environments; and it provides legal incentives for employers to prevent and respond to mistreatment of employees at work.

Surveys and studies demonstrate that 16-21% of employees experience health-endangering workplace bullying, abuse and harassment, and that this behavior is four times more prevalent than sexual harassment. These studies have also documented the serious effects on these targeted employees. They include: shame, humiliation, stress, loss of sleep, severe anxiety, depression, posttraumatic stress disorder, reduced immunity to infection, gastrointestinal disorders, hypertension and pathophysiological changes that increase the risk of cardiovascular disease.

walked to the beat of patriotic tunes. Ladies Auxiliary provided every service man and woman with a traditional poppy flower pin, along with a donation to Post 1250 of the American Legion.

"We can never repay the Veterans for their services to our country," said Florida Mayor Jim Pawliczek.

Memorial Day originally marked a day of mourning for those lost in the Civil War, but by the time World War I came around, the US extended this day to honor all who have perished while protecting their country.

Although many died for the nation, many have also lived to carry on the legacy and remembrance of Memorial Day. A few of these very veterans were present at the parade, like Florida resident Tom Fuller. Fuller served two and a half years as an engineer in Vietnam and is currently incumbent Deputy Mayor and Police Commissioner of Florida. He recalled coming home from war in 1969 and having his brother tease him.

"He used to throw fire crackers at my feet to make me jump," chuckled Tom.

Not long after, brother Fray Fuller packed his bags to leave in 1971. Fray, Commander of AL Post 1250, served for a year as a driver supplying water to small villages. The two survived, and each Memorial Day the two come together again to celebrate our service men and women.

Younger generations such as Florida Little League and Boy/Girl Scouts also take part in the parade to keep the tradition alive. Boy and Girl Scouts each carried one decorated floral wreath to be placed on veteran monuments at Florida High School and Cemetery.

Memorial Day will continue to be a day of mixed emotions. It will remain a day of grieving and remembrance for many, but it is also the first day of summer for many and a reason to celebrate our current soldiers.

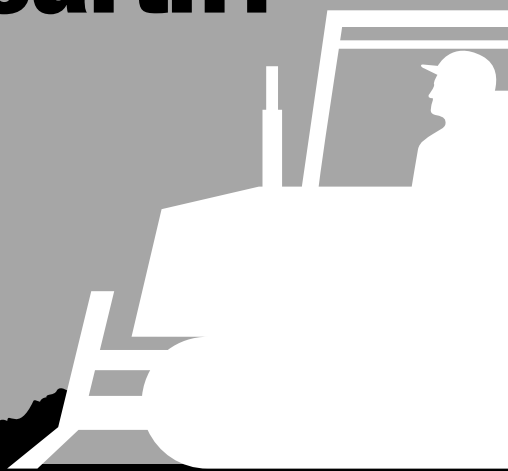

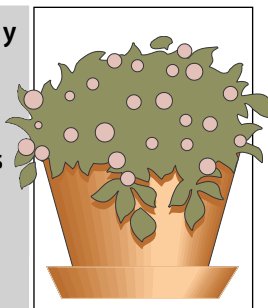

salt, the American flag, and upside down glass, and a vase with a rose and ribbon. The table and everything on it was symbolic, in honor of those comrades currently missing referred to as POWs or MIAs. The small size of the table represented the frailty of one victim against his many oppressors. The white cloth symbolizes the purity of soldiers intentions to respond to country's call to duty. The rose symbolizes both the blood they might have shed and the loved ones at home keeping faith for their return. The slice of lemon symbolizes their bitter fate, and along with that, is the salt that represents the tears of many families. The chair is empty and the glass is inverted because they were not here to toast with their families. The lighted candle, in essence, is the light of hope that we all carry in our hearts on this special day.

The ceremony continued with several tributes to the soldiers who had fought and died in all the American wars as early as the 1750s and as present as the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Wars fought over 130 foreign lands and over one million casualties as Post 1443 Commander Brian said, "These men can not be replaced, but they must be remembered continuing their legacy of democracy, decency, and patriotism."

County Legislator Al Buckbee made a touching speech about all the men that

sacrificed their security and lives for the fight for independence. "Today we honor the unsung heroes that lead the road to independence from the 1750s extending up to today."

Memorial Day to many is very personal when one knows someone in the army. Judge of Warwick Nancy B. Brenner DeAngelo attended the ceremony and even though for her today is more like 'decoration day' as she puts it, remembering the memory of her father and uncle who both died in WWII caused her to urge everyone, "to remember and keep the soldiers in your hearts and minds because if you do they will always be alive, they will continue to live in our hearts." Assemblywoman Annie Rabbitt also said a few words. She shared her 'kitchen table story' with the group; currently a soldier on leave is staying at her home and when asked what can she do for him the soldier, Cody, replied, "Pray for us." So on this patriotic day, and everyday after, keep these soldiers in your prayers. As Mayor of Greenwood Lake Barbara Moore said: "Honor their courage, strength, and selfless actions. Remember their excellence, heroism, and dedication to the protection of your life and liberty."

FIFTY YEARS AGO June 1, 1960

- In spite of the great scientific and technological advances our country has made, we still have not learned to live together in civil society in peace and harmony with our neighbors, Judge Hubert T. Delany, retired Justice of the Domestic Relations court of the City of New York, told townspeople assembled in Warwick Ceremony for the Memorial Day observances. Much of this, he said, is due to the fact that Americans have forgotten the teachings they learned as children, particularly those of the Ten Commandments which deal with our responsibility towards others.
- Warwick firemen received an early morning call to extinguish a fire of unknown origin, which had broken out in an automobile owned by William P. Higgins, at the family home while they were sleeping. The family were awakened early that morning by the continuous sound of the automobile's horn., and thus became aware the vehicle was on fire.
- A classified ad read: LOST – Men's Black Wallet: Reward for return of driver's license, draft card and registration; keep money. Return to George Potter, or to the *Dispatch* office.
- Hayes Barber Shop will close at noon on Friday, June 10 and will reopen at noon on Tuesday, June 14.
- The coronation of Miss Jane Romanoski, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. & Mrs. John Romanoski, of Florida, as queen of the 1960 Junior Prom and Steve Appelbaum, 17-year-old son of Mr. & Mrs. Alexander Appelbaum, as king highlighted the formal affair at S. S. Seward Institute.

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO May 29, 1985

- Warwick's Memorial Day observance was certainly

the only one of its kind anywhere in the United States. Nowhere else could a father and his six sons, all in the service, have led a Memorial Day Parade the way the Robert Stewart family did here in Warwick. Afforded the honor of carrying the colors at the head of the line of march, Staff Sergeant Robert Stewart proudly marched with his sons, Specialist 4th Alexander, Second Lt. James, Ralph, Paratrooper Robert, Marine Staff Sergeant Paul and Army Specialist 5th Timothy.

- At first it was thought that the odorous substance spilled from the back of a pickup truck at the intersection of Warwick's Main and West Streets was either paint or paint thinner. It wasn't; it was Bicep, a weed killer. A Goshen farmer was transporting the 30 gallon drum in the back of his truck when the drum pitched out of the truck bed and ruptured.

- The use of weed killer along sections of Warwick's railroad tracks has sparked anger from a number of residents living on Covered Bridge, Sanfordville and Fancher Roads. The group protected its use by writing a letter to Tony Osterdahl of the Delaware and Otsego System in Cooperstown, NY.

- A fire that threatened the historic Union African Methodist Episcopal Church in Warwick and other structures in a densely inhabited section of McEwen St. in the Village of Warwick was brought under control by Warwick firemen without a major disaster.

- Miss Natasha Nowicki, daughter of Peter and Deborah Nowicki of Florida, was an entrant in the 1985 Little Jr. Miss Eastern NY pageant at the Marriot Westchester, Tarrytown, NY.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO May 31, 1995

- Impressive and a well-attended ceremony marked the unveiling of an historical marker in memory of Rev. Hedley Cooper, at the Cooper Tree in Greenwood Lake. Rev. Cooper, former Rector of the Good Shepherd Church in Greenwood Lake, resigned from his position at the church in 1917 to serve as chaplain with the Red Cross. He was immediately sent to the front lines and while responding to a young, critically wounded soldier, Cooper gave him his own gas mask until he could be carried to safety. Cooper was then killed on the battlefield by an enemy bullet.

their country on Memorial Day, and every other day of the year, were made by principal speakers attending the Warwick Memorial, Village of Florida and Pine Island memorial parades and services.

FIVE YEARS AGO June 1, 2005

- On a beautiful and warm, sunny day – by far one of the best days this spring – the citizens of Warwick gathered to honor those who had died fighting for the rights of freedoms that Americans hold dear. Army veteran Tom Gladitsch, an Army MP who served in Vietnam, and his wife, Marybeth, led the annual Town of Warwick Memorial Day Parade.

- At a recent Warwick Lions Club meeting, Carol and George McManus both received acknowledgment from the Melvin Jones Fellowship, which is the highest honor presented for patrons of humanity, who perform deeds that outlast a lifetime.

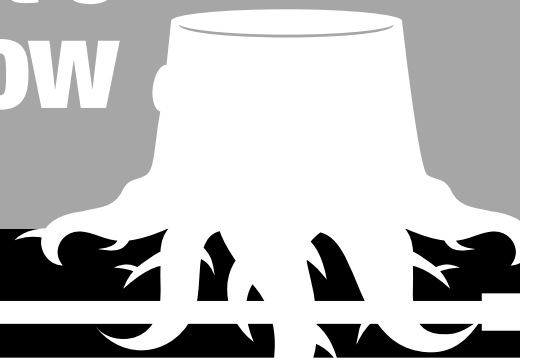
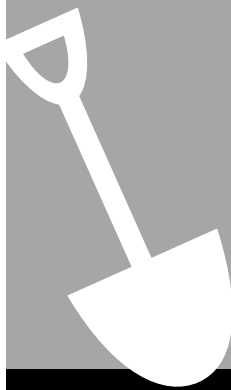

Then there's the case of Charlie Lau, considered by many the greatest hitting coach of all time - but a .255 lifetime hitter himself.
